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HORIZON RELIANCE CREW RECOGNIZED FOR RESCUE; RELIANCE WILL REPOWER

M.E.B.A. and American Maritime Congress representatives were on hand on Tuesday at a D.C. event honoring officers and crew of the M.E.B.A.-contracted HORIZON RELIANCE for their efforts in an at-sea rescue.

The Association for Rescue at Sea (AFRAS) sponsored the awards ceremony and reception that took place at the Rayburn House Office building on Capitol Hill. The normally annual event skipped a year due to COVID but used the Tuesday ceremony to play catch-up. Aside from the HORIZON RELIANCE, a few foreign flag vessels were honored for rescues as well as several Coastguardsmen who distinguished themselves with at-sea heroics.

Headlining the event were Congressman Salud Carbajal (D-CA-24) and Coast Guard Commandant Admiral Karl Schultz.

In November of 2020, the Pasha/Sunrise containership RELIANCE, was called to the scene where two pilots from a single engine Pilatus PC-12 NGX aircraft were haplessly floating in a raft after crash landing into the Pacific due to engine failure about 1,060 miles northeast of Oahu, Hawaii. Another vessel, the crude oil tanker MT ARIEL, attempted rescue operations several times through 30 knot winds and 10-foot waves but were unsuccessful. The RELIANCE proved more maneuverable for such a rescue and the crew worked in tandem to quickly and efficiently scoop them aboard to safety. The RELIANCE crew provided medical care, food, water and dry clothes for the pilots and proceeded to Honolulu.

The crew is comprised of M.E.B.A. engine officers, MM&P deck officers and an SIU unlicensed crew. Chief Engineer Justin Raby headed up the engine room during that voyage along with 1st A/E David Rivera. The vessel's Captain Mark Tuck was at the ceremony on Tuesday and accepted the prestigious "AMVER Plaque" on behalf of the RELIANCE crew.

Late last year, the vessel crew was honored with a public service award from the Coast Guard for their roles in the rescue. The ship has also been nominated for one of the seafarer awards that will be doled out at the next Admiral of the Ocean Sea (AOTOS) ceremony in December.

M.E.B.A. Secretary-Treasurer Roland "Rex" Rexha, who was on hand at the Capitol Hill ceremony on Tuesday, lauded the M.E.B.A. engineers, as well as the rest of the crew on the RELIANCE, who once-again demonstrated their expertise and shipboard wizardry to effect a successful rescue. "We have the finest and most highly-trained seagoing mariners in the industry." Rex said. "U.S. seafarers are diligent, productive and deliver the goods without fanfare. It's gratifying when their excellent ongoing efforts, which many take for granted, are recognized every once in a while."

In other HORIZON RELIANCE news, Pasha announced that the 42-year old vessel will undergo an LNG retrofit from steam propulsion power to dual fuel. The planned work would involve the installation of a high-pressure fuel gas supply system (FGSS), power management system (PMS), ship performance monitor (SPM) and digital solutions for data collection, as well as the full automation of all the new systems onboard the ship.

MAERSK KANSAS WILL CREW UP IN LAST WEEK OF YEAR

Maersk Line, Ltd. shored up its plans to replace the aging MAERSK IDAHO with a newer vessel. The incoming MAERSK KANSAS is seven years younger than the IDAHO which is coming up against a Maritime Security Program age restriction. The KANSAS will take over the MSP chit and be deployed into the company's Trans-Atlantic Northern European service.

The IDAHO is transitioning to the company's international fleet as the newer vessel comes in. M.E.B.A. will crew both ships during the transition. Senior officers will go up the KANSAS gangway in the last week of December with the remaining crew joining after the 1st of the New Year.

The KANSAS is the sister ship to the SAFMARINE MAFADI. It was constructed in 2007 and is a 958-foot, 4,824 TEU container vessel propelled by a Wartsila Sulzer 8RT-Flex96C engine.

SEA YEAR PROGRAM ON HOLD AS USMMA RE-EXAMINES CADET PROTECTIONS

For the second time in five years, the U.S. Merchant Marine Academy is pushing the pause button on its sea year program to examine ways to improve safeguards for midshipmen sailing aboard commercial vessels as part of the program. The decision was made by the Department of Transportation which oversees the Academy and days after the Chairs of key Congressional committees urged a suspension of the program. The move comes weeks after allegations that a sea year cadet was sexually assaulted onboard a deep sea vessel in 2019.

The Congressional Members pointed out that the Academy had paused sea year in 2016 to implement safeguards to protect participating midshipmen. "But those changes clearly did not work," lawmakers stated, "and we are concerned that the cadets remain in danger. Following the decision, the school issued a letter to students making them aware of the news. That letter noted that the Academy is examining "a number of recommendations for both immediate and longer-term measures to improve safety on campus and at sea for King's Point cadets and for all mariners."

The M.E.B.A. again underscored that sexual assault and sexual harassment are completely unacceptable in any context and won't be tolerated in M.E.B.A.-represented workplaces. Cadets, and everyone onboard, must be treated with respect.

MATSON COMMITS TO NET ZERO GHG BY 2050; IMO, ITF CONTINUE PUSH

Matson Inc. is onboard with new environmental sustainability goals that would put them on target for zero greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions in their fleet by 2050. Matson Navigation Company is a subsidiary of Matson Inc. which published their long-term environmental goals in a recently issued Sustainability Report.

"We are committed to doing our part in helping the world decarbonize and limit climate change," said Matt Cox, chairman and chief executive officer. "We believe we have a responsibility to significantly reduce our carbon footprint by lowering our greenhouse gas emissions and our aim is to achieve these medium- and long-term goals by improving fleet and operational efficiency. Matson is supporting efforts to create an industry-funded research and development program to accelerate zero-carbon fuels and technologies. While these transformative technologies develop, we will continue to focus on improving the efficiency of our fleet and terminal operations."

The company committed to reducing fleet greenhouse gas emissions by 40 percent by 2030, and achieving net zero fleet GHG emissions by 2050.

At the ongoing United Nations Climate Change Conference (COP 26), in Glasgow, United Kingdom, the International Maritime Organization continues its push to cut the amount of GHG emissions from international shipping. The International Transport Workers' Federation (ITF) is also vocal on behalf of working toward a cleaner industry.

"Seafarers want to be part of the solution," said Dave Heindel, ITF Seafarers' Section chair. "We want to be proud of the action taken by our industry. We want to lead the transition." ITF is also calling for the industry and regulators to commit to a target of zero-carbon by 2050.

"People who work at sea witness the impacts of climate change every day and are extremely concerned that their industry is not acting quickly enough," said Stephen Cotton, the ITF's General Secretary. "Huge changes are needed swiftly to switch the shipping industry away from fossil fuels. Seafarers have the passion, knowledge and ideas to help move the industry to a carbon-free future."

UAW JOHN DEERE WORKERS REMAIN ON STRIKE

10,100 workers at 14 different John Deere locations are still seeking a fair contract after 55% of voting members rejected a tentative agreement that would have ended the three-week strike.

UAW International spokesperson Brian Rothenberg said that negotiators continue with the tractor company to resolve worker concerns. John Deere has enjoyed astronomical profits during the pandemic and workers, who have kept the company going during difficult times, are unenthused by the lukewarm wages and benefits being offered. "The strike against John Deere and company will continue as we discuss next steps with the company," the UAW stated. "Pickets will continue and any updates will be provided through the local union."
