M.E.B.A. OFFICERS PART OF RESCUE OPERATIONS ON OSG VESSEL

The crew aboard an OSG-managed product tanker are being lauded for their humanitarian efforts in aiding desperate Cuban migrants who were enduring their 12th day at sea during a dash toward freedom.

On March 30th, on a run from Corpus Christi to Jacksonville about 185 nautical miles SSW of Southwest Pass, LA, the lookout on the OVERSEAS LONG BEACH spied a small craft about a mile and a half away loaded with a dozen Cuban citizens frantically waving their arms to get the vessel's attention.

The officer on watch promptly informed the Master, the crew was mustered and the vessel was diverted from its course to provide assistance. On their way to Mexico, the migrants had run short on water, food, fuel and were in need of medical attention.

The craft was brought alongside to assess the situation and the LONG BEACH crew provided them essential supplies like food, water, first-aid kits, blankets, flashlights, emergency signals, and life jackets while awaiting further guidance from Coast Guard Sector New Orleans.

Hours later, after further consultation with the Coast Guard, the LONG BEACH took the twelve Cuban migrants aboard until they could be transferred to a USCG cutter off Key West. Upon boarding, a security search and first-aid evaluations were undertaken. The migrants were set up in the Crew Lounge with mattresses, blankets, water, and food. One of the crew members acted as an interpreter and coordinated care for the migrants. The interpreter determined that the migrants had been at sea for 12 days, had only ¹/₂ gallon of water left, and had been without food for approximately 6 to 7 days. During the next 36 hours in transit to Key West, the migrants were fed, provided with showers, and given access to facilities to clean up and change. Each person received a basic medical evaluation and was determined to be in generally good health with no signs of dehydration or starvation. Two days later, they were transferred to the Coast Guard cutter near Key West.

The crew of the OVERSEAS LONG BEACH was rightfully lauded for demonstrating one of the best traditions of seafaring. Their efforts were commended by OSG CEO Sam Norton who said,

"...All on board chose to act with honest concern and empathy for those in need in a manner which affirms, in the most visible way possible, the standards of ethics and transparency that lie at the core of OSG's culture. Thanks to the individuals involved for a job well done, for the care and attention that were offered those in distress, and for the level of professionalism exhibited by all in handling this matter effectively."

The ship's Deck officers are, as yet, unrepresented. SIU represents the unlicensed. M.E.B.A. permanents onboard the vessel at the time included C/E Brian Gerrish, 1st A/E Chris Waugaman and 2nd A/E Jonathan DiBacco.

M.E.B.A. & U.S. SHIPPING INDUSTRY PROMOTE POLICIES ON CAPITOL HILL For the first time since 2019, a cross-section of maritime industry representatives, including the M.E.B.A., spent a full day on Capitol Hill promoting U.S. shipping as part of the Maritime Sail-In, normally an annual event. The COVID hiatus canceled the last three such events but on March 30th, over 100 industry representatives took part in the day-long maritime deluge of Congress to broadcast the importance of U.S.-flag shipping and solicit support for crucial maritime statutes and programs.

The cross-section of participants included representatives from maritime unions, shipping companies, state maritime academies and other organizations. They visited almost 150 House and Senate offices on both sides of the aisle to educate and promote federal policies advancing the U.S. Merchant Marine.

As Congress prepares its budget and spending priorities, industry leaders shared their expertise and personal stories on how protecting critical initiatives like cargo preference, the Maritime Security Program (MSP) and the Tanker Security Program (TSP) play a vital role in supporting our national defense and good-paying union jobs. Other critical issues that were highlighted among advocates included discussion surrounding the declining presence of the U.S. merchant fleet over the past 50 years in comparison to the Chinese fleet, as well as the importance of recruiting and retaining a highly qualified maritime workforce for the future. With the constant <u>turnover</u> in Congress, educating Members of Congress and their staff is one of the most important activities the Union conducts in support of its membership and jobs.

M.E.B.A. PRIDE FOR JESSE CALHOON DAY

Members and retirees expressed appreciation and pride for the recently-celebrated Jesse Calhoon Day, an M.E.B.A.-specific holiday that was created by a member resolution in 2011. 2023 marked the second year that the April 4 birthday of M.E.B.A.'s modern patriarch was celebrated as a holiday for the Union halls, the first step toward a future fleet-wide contractual holiday. Before last year, Jesse Calhoon Day was informally observed for a decade. The ILWU and ILA, among others, also have union-specific observances honoring their labor leaders (Harry Bridges, Teddy Gleason, etc.) and M.E.B.A. members expressed appreciation that the nation's oldest and finest maritime union is finally recognizing one of their own.

The day is dedicated to the man who headed up the Union in exceptional fashion for 22 years. Among many other achievements under Jesse Calhoon's administration, the Union established the training school which bears his name, merged the deep sea districts, Pacific Coast District and District 1 into a single all coast unit, and transformed M.E.B.A.'s pension plan into the best in the maritime industry. Born on April 4, 1923, Jesse made his final voyage on October 22, 2013 at the age of 90.

The resolution that was introduced during the April 2011 membership meeting at M.E.B.A.'s Seattle Union hall was approved by the membership the next month. It read, (in part), "Whereas, we the M.E.B.A. members should not forget all that Jesse Calhoon has done for the M.E.B.A. including, but not limited to, establishing the Calhoon M.E.B.A. Engineering School, the M.E.B.A. Pension Trust, the M.E.B.A. Medical Plan and the Money Purchase Benefit Plan, via collective bargaining."

"Be it Resolved, that April 4th of every calendar year starting in the 2012 calendar year shall be deemed an M.E.B.A. paid holiday, and this day shall be celebrated, respected and remembered by all of the rank & file M.E.B.A. members as Jesse M. Calhoon's birthday, and further that all M.E.B.A. Union halls shall be closed for business on this date."
