

A Message from MEBA President

For the last year, the main topic of discussion in maritime circles throughout the nation and within government has been about the "mariner shortage." This has garnered more attention than usual, as our politicians and generals are waking up to the realization that our nation's military sealift capacity is far too small in the event of a conflict with China. The military successfully pushed for a 10-ship Tanker Security Program (TSP) to help keep our fleets and soldiers fueled up and lessen our dependence on foreign-flag vessels, which is built into the current war plan. The military says they need 20, or even 40, of these US-flag TSP tankers in the event of a real conflict. However, due to our nation's lost focus on self-reliance, the surplus pool of mariners we had is gone. We all know it takes a decade or more to make senior mariners. So how will we crew the 10-40 tankers our country needs, let alone the additional mariners needed for the troop and cargo sealift required?

First, let's examine how the "mariner shortage" suddenly appeared. During COVID, some thought you could simply quarantine mariners away from their families without pay, force injections on them without a discussion, keep people onboard well beyond their assignments, and restrict all shore leave. No one should be surprised that mariners left the industry in record numbers, and that no one came to fill their shoes. Most Americans' job satisfaction actually improved as a result of COVID related changes, including remote work arrangements, Zoom meetings, reduced required travel, and flexible hours. But the job satisfaction for mariners markedly decreased.

Thus, in my view, the course to reversing the "mariner shortage" is not particularly difficult to chart: **Make the jobs desirable and people will come.**

The M.E.B.A. stands at the forefront of this effort — protecting our mariners, demanding safe working conditions and higher pay, requiring high speed internet to see your newborn child, insisting on improved company support and proper supplies, nailing down fair rotations, and ensuring compensation when you are restricted to ship. We all know shore leave can be hard to coordinate with the workload, but when mariners are told they can't go ashore, it is absolutely infuriating and demoralizing.

The M.E.B.A. has fared far better than most during the "mariner shortage," and it's easy to determine why. We have the best contracts and work rules, we proudly and aggressively represent our members, our halls are at full employment, and, of course, our pension and medical plans are the envy of the industry. It is for these reasons maritime officers choose the M.E.B.A. for their entire careers.

However, there is more to be done. This administration is focused on improving our representation and presence to ensure we retain those we have and recruit the best new officers. This starts with improving the Hall experience to ensure they match the professionalism of our mariners. We've improved the Charleston Hall, added a Houston Representative, and moved the Jacksonville and Cleveland Halls to better locations. We are determined to improve things anywhere it makes fiscal sense.

We're committed to proper representation of our inland units and are directing more resources toward them. We're also focused on improving the M.E.B.A. Deck Officer experience, including higher wages and more opportunities. It started by finally securing an industry standard agreement with Liberty Maritime – they had gone eight years without a negotiated increase. That agreement, and newfound peace, has led to Liberty Maritime adding an additional vessel to their roster, the LIBERTY POWER. The M.E.B.A. also added three commercial ships with Keystone Shipping to further complement their MARAD offerings and bolster our Deck Officer options and career paths. We're engaged with the MM&P to finally secure a fair Pass-Through agreement. In addition to the Pass-Through, our M.E.B.A. Deck Brothers and Sisters have billets with Maersk M-Ships, MTL/Hapag, Norwegian Cruise Line-America, Keystone Shipping, Interlake Steamship Company, Chevron, Liberty Maritime, Staten Island Ferries, Golden Gate Ferries, Delaware Pilots, Cape May-Lewes Ferry, Boston Marine and Samson Tug & Barge.

In closing, the M.E.B.A. is the best place for a maritime career, and with your help and support we will keep making it better.

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
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

M.E.B.A. Crews are Part of New-Look Flag Fleet

The U.S.-flag fleet faces significant challenges including the ongoing scourge of flag-of-convenience shipping, aging vessels and concerning recruitment and retention issues. Federal programs and statutes continue to support U.S. shipping including the Maritime Security Program (MSP), Cargo Preference programs and the Jones Act that enable an American presence on the high seas and inland waters. This year the Tanker Security Program, a fleet of commercial U.S.-flag petroleum product tankers, is expected to launch with M.E.B.A. participation.

The development of new technologies and innovations have helped to improve efficiencies and reduce costs, and new initiatives along with positive recent developments indicate that the industry is on an upward trend. Here's a nutshell rundown of some of the latest developments from the M.E.B.A. deep-sea sector and beyond:

Keystone Shipping Co.

Keystone recently took over a Large, Medium-Speed, Roll-On, Roll-Off (LMSR) vessel as part of the Government's recapitalization of the aging Ready Reserve Force. The Military Sealift Command transferred the USNS BOB HOPE to the Maritime Administration and Keystone was assigned as the "general agent." As a result, M.E.B.A. Deck and Engine officers crewed up the newly renamed M/V BOB HOPE which is berthed in Portland, OR.

In December, Keystone added a trio of Jones-Act vessels to its fleet after OSG declined to exercise its extension options for three Veteran-class MT-46 Product Tankers. M.E.B.A. engine officers had already been serving on those vessels for OSG and continue in that capacity for Keystone. But with

the turnover, the Union picked up the deck work as well (5 per ship, 40-hour work-week with OT after 40). Keystone also renamed the vessels. The OVERSEAS LOS ANGELES became the SEAKAY STAR, the OVERSEAS TEXAS CITY is now known as the SEAKAY SKY and the OVERSEAS NEW YORK was redubbed SEAKAY VALOR.

The M.E.B.A. also inked a contract with full benefits to provide augmenting licensed officers through Keystone on the Great Lakes Maritime Academy (GLMA) training ship. The agreement was put in place utilizing Keystone Ocean Services, Inc. and mirrors past contracts with Keystone that provide covered employment for M.E.B.A. marine officers. Those agreements provide for augmenting officers aboard commercial U.S.-flag research vessels as well as engineers on vessels in the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) fleet.

Matson

Matson Navigation is taking its fleet to the next level with the order of three brand-new Aloha-class containerships to hit the high seas in 2026 and 2027. These 3,600 TEU capacity vessels will join the DANIEL K. INOUYE and KAIMANA HILA, two top-of-the-line Aloha-class ships that have already been put into action. With dual fuel engines capable of running on conventional marine fuels or liquefied natural gas (LNG), these green ships boast a fuelefficient hull design and environmentally safe features, like double hull fuel tanks and freshwater ballast systems. The new ships will be LNG-ready from day one. These Alohaclass ships will replace three older vessels currently deployed in Matson's China-Long Beach Express (CLX) service, which would allow the company to deploy bigger and faster vessels in its Alaska service, providing additional capacity and speed to benefit Hawaii and the CLX service.

In recent years, Matson also welcomed two new Kanaloaclass combination container/roll-on, roll-off vessels, built at San Diego's NASSCO shipyard, the MATSONIA and LURLINE.

Last year, the company announced it was moving forward with the main engine retrofit of their containership DANIEL K. INOUYE to dual-fuel LNG. Now, the company recently revealed that the INOUYE's sistership, the KAIMANA HILA (constructed in 2019), would undergo a main engine conversion from a MAN B&W S90ME-C10.5 unit to a dual-fuel ME-GI unit capable of running on LNG. Matson also plans a future conversion of the Kanaloa-class vessels (LURLINE & MATSONIA) to LNG. The company previously announced it would retrofit the 2003-built container ship MANUKAI to operate on LNG.

Interlake

Interlake Steamship recently welcomed the first U.S.-flag newbuild Great Lakes freighter in almost 40 years. The 639-foot, 28,000 DWT self-unloading bulk carrier M/V MARK W. BARKER, built at Fincantieri's Wisconsin shipyard, is crewed with M.E.B.A. Deck and Engine officers as well as an M.E.B.A. Chief Steward. This is the company's first newbuild since 1981.

All 11 commercial vessels in the Interlake fleet are back underway following a 10-week winter shutdown for Great Lakes shipping. Last year, the M.E.B.A. reached an agreement with Interlake to cover winter work with a collective bargaining agreement. M.E.B.A. members and applicants utilized by the company in that capacity receive good wages and benefits, as well as pension and medical paid on earned vacation days.

In 2022, the Company demonstrated its appreciation for mariners in its Great Lakes fleet by voluntarily increasing the daily base wage and overtime rates. Recognizing that cost-of-living increases in these inflationary times have proved difficult for many, the company provided additional relief for their valued mariner force.

Pasha

Pasha Hawaii has brought two new vessels into its fleet, honoring the Pasha family's past with vessels built for the future. The Pasha newbuilds GEORGE III and JANET MARIE mark the start of a new era for the company. The magnificent 774-foot LNG-fueled Ohana-class containerships were constructed by Keppel AmFels in Brownsville, Texas. The ships are crewed by M.E.B.A., MM&P and SIU.

The vessels are named in honor of George Pasha III and Janet Marie, the late parents of George Pasha IV, the current President and CEO of The Pasha Group. With a capacity of 2,525 TEUs and a speedy sailing pace of 23.0 knots, each of these Jones Act vessels will serve the Hawaii-Mainland trade lane with the utmost efficiency.

Last year, Pasha/Sunrise won a bid to operate the SUNY Maritime training vessel EMPIRE STATE bringing in new jobs for M.E.B.A. engineers, as well as additional engineers covering for several unlicensed positions. The agreement mirrored similar past agreements with Pasha to provide augmenting engineers aboard the California State Maritime Academy training ship GOLDEN BEAR.

OSG

OSG Ship Management supplemented its fleet with a vessel the company recently brought under the U.S.-flag. The 29,708 gross tonnage chemical/oil products tanker OVERSEAS SUN COAST was built in 2019. The 183-meter, 50,000 DWT vessel, fitted with an exhaust gas cleaning system, began operating under the U.S.-flag in January.

The company exercised options to extend bareboat charters for six Veteran-class MT-46 product tankers including those for the OVERSEAS HOUSTON, OVERSEAS LONG BEACH, OVERSEAS BOSTON, OVERSEAS NIKISKI, OVERSEAS MARTINEZ and OVERSEAS ANACORTES. The three-year extensions begin in December 2023. The other MT-46 tanker operated by OSG (OVERSEAS TAMPA) is chartered until December 2025.

OSG recently announced that three of their vessels will be part of the inaugural 10 vessel Tanker Security Program fleet. Expected to launch this year, the TSP is a fleet of 10 commercial U.S.-flag petroleum product tankers supporting U.S. strategic defense needs. The program was created to reduce military reliance on foreign-flag commercial vessels while also expanding the qualified mariner pool. The TSP has received consistent bipartisan Congressional support and is fully funded at \$60 million (\$6 million per vessel) for Fiscal Year 2023. A future expansion of the program is already being proposed by Members of Congress.

OSG was awarded three slots in the program which is administered by the Maritime Administration. OSG medium range tankers OVERSEAS SANTORINI, OVERSEAS MYKONOS and OVERSEAS SUN COAST were approved for the TSP.

M.E.B.A. recently worked out an agreement with OSG to provide additional incentives for our hardworking members in the fleet to better attract and retain high quality officers working for the company. The Union's contract with OSG covering licensed engineers runs to June 15, 2026. The enhancement was made retroactive to January 1, 2022 and will remain in effect until June 30, 2023. The company also replaced their direct-hire 270-day assignments with 180-day rotary assignments which puts the Third Engineer jobs back in the Union hall and on the job board.

School Ships

Philly Shipyard is getting ready to launch the first of five cutting-edge National Security Multi-Mission Vessels (NSMVs) this year. The NSMVs will replace aging training ships at state maritime academies across the U.S.

The NSMVs are much more than simply replacements for old vessels. The next generation of maritime cadets will

have access to the most advanced training vessels available. They are state-of-the-art training and educational platforms that come equipped with top-of-the-line features such as modern hospital facilities, a helicopter pad, and the ability to accommodate up to 1,000 people in times of humanitarian need. They'll provide vital roll-on/roll-off and container storage capacity for use during humanitarian assistance and disaster relief missions. That makes them an essential part of the nation's emergency response capabilities.

The first NSMV will replace the 60-year old SUNY training vessel EMPIRE STATE VI later this year. The second ship will relieve the 54-year old TS KENNEDY at Massachusetts Maritime Academy in 2024, and the third and fourth newbuilds will replace vessels at Maine Maritime Academy and Texas A&M Maritime Academy in 2024 and 2025, respectively. The fifth and final NSMV will go to the California State University Maritime Academy, with construction beginning this year and delivery slated for 2026. Each ship is being specifically designed to be compatible with the pier length, draft restrictions, and mooring limitations at each of the maritime training academies.

Government Fleet & More

The Union also welcomed in a series of newbuilds for the Military Sealift Command adding several more Expeditionary Sea Bases, Expeditionary Fast Transport vessels and Replenishment Oilers built at Austal USA and NASSCO. Continued Government budgeting is funding new vessels for the Army Corps and NOAA fleets as well, and new boats recently debuted for the Staten Island Ferries.

The U.S.-flag shipping fleet has undergone significant changes over the years but there are reasons to be optimistic about the future of our industry. The investment by American shipping companies illustrates continued opportunities that lie ahead for the U.S. fleet and American mariners. The U.S.-flag fleet will likely be shaped by a variety of economic, environmental, and political factors. Our government has traditionally been supportive of the domestic shipping industry and has implemented policies designed to encourage U.S. companies to operate ships under the Stars and Stripes. However, changes in government policies or trade agreements could have an impact on the competitiveness of the U.S. flag fleet. Efforts are underway to support the industry, including government programs to encourage the construction of new vessels and support for maritime education and training programs to develop the next generation of skilled mariners. You can do your part by promoting the policies that support our industry and by contributing to the M.E.B.A.'s Political Action Fund.

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Supporting lawmakers who understand the value of U.S.-flag shipping to our nation's security and economy is the principal focus of the P.A.F. Contributions are used to educate Members of Congress, State and local officials, regardless of political party, about the importance of our industry. The PAF helps broaden our relationship with maritime-friendly politicians and helps elect those who recognize the significance of the U.S. Merchant Marine. Next Generation Mariners: 2023 Cadet Internship Program

The Calhoon M.E.B.A. Engineering School is set for this summer's Licensed Cadet Internship program that helps young mariners get a head start on their shipping careers. The program will run from July 10 to July 28. Up to 80 cadets from various maritime academies across the country can attend. When cadets from a particular maritime school are unable to take part because of conflicts such as summer sea terms, the School provides additional opportunities in other months to visit its facilities.

The annual program helps mold the next generation of M.E.B.A. mariners and eases their way toward a shipping

career with the Union, if they so choose. Among other things during their three weeks, program participants will take advantage of a series of training courses including Welding, Machine Shop, Diesel, High Voltage Safety, Electrical Systems, and MSC CONMAR that will help prepare these next-generation mariners.

Cadets can take part in the program without making a commitment to the Union, but while they attend, they'll learn more about the excellent career opportunities that the M.E.B.A. presents.

Mariners Prevent Disaster During Dash for Freedom

The high seas can be a dangerous place. But for the crew of the Maersk Line-managed ALLIANCE FAIRFAX it was just another October day at sea - until they spotted a column of thick smoke coming from a small boat passing between Cuba and the Florida Keys. Without hesitation, the crew contacted the Coast Guard and drew close to the homemade foam block and wooden boat. Spanish speaker Jacob Rochez, the ALLIANCE FAIRFAX Dayman, learned that the boat's occupants were fleeing Cuba and had an unconscious man on board. The FAIRFAX crew sprang into action and lowered a lifeboat filled with medical supplies and extra water. Crewed by 3rd A/E Harold Abdul-Ahad, C/M Ernest Caponegro, Dayman Rochez, and Dayman Benjamin Romero, the rescue boat pulled alongside the Cuban craft. They brought over supplies and treated the distressed passenger who was seasick and dehydrated. A Coast Guard vessel soon arrived and took the stricken refugees aboard to bring them to a safe location where their eligibility for asylum or other forms of immigration relief was to be determined.


M.E.B.A. members aboard the ALLIANCE FAIRFAX at the time included C/E W. Andrew Dickman, 1st A/E Joe Glywasky, 2nd A/E Darnell Slayton and 3rd A/E Harold Abdul-Ahad. MM&P represents the Deck Officers and SIU represents the unlicensed mariners. They showed bravery and compassion in their response. It's a reminder of the humanity that can be found even in the most challenging situations at sea.

Sadly, Cuban citizens continue to make desperate small craft dashes for freedom to escape their oppressive regime. On March 30th near Pass, LA, the OSG-managed product tanker OVERSEAS LONG BEACH spied a small craft in the distance loaded with a dozen Cuban citizens frantically waving their arms to get the vessel's attention.

The crew was mustered and the vessel was diverted from its course to provide assistance. On their 12th day at sea on their way to Mexico, the migrants were in dire need of water, food, fuel and medical attention. The craft was brought alongside to assess the situation and the LONG BEACH crew provided them essential supplies like food, water, first-aid kits, blankets, flashlights, emergency signals, and life jackets while awaiting further guidance from Coast Guard Sector New Orleans. Hours later, after further consultation with the Coast Guard, the LONG BEACH took the twelve Cuban migrants aboard and provided care until they could be transferred to a USCG cutter off Key West.

The crew of the OVERSEAS LONG BEACH was lauded for exercising humanitarian assistance, one of the greatest traditions of seafaring. OSG CEO Sam Norton said, "...All on board chose to act with honest concern and empathy for those in need in a manner which affirms, in the most visible way possible, the standards of ethics and transparency that lie at the core of OSG's culture"

The ship's Deck officers are, as yet, unrepresented. SIU represents the unlicensed. M.E.B.A. permanents onboard the vessel at the time included C/E Brian Gerrish, 1st A/E Chris Waugaman and 2nd A/E Jonathan DiBacco.

ODF 2023: M.E.B.A. Goes to the End of the Earth

Imagine being stranded in a vast frozen wasteland, in one of the most inhospitable environments on earth. That's the reality for the dedicated scientists stationed at the South Pole's McMurdo Station, on the southern tip of Ross Island.

But since 1955, the Military Sealift Command has overseen an annual resupply mission to help scientists survive the long, isolated Antarctic winter. During Operation Deep Freeze 2023, MSC chartered two M.E.B.A.-crewed vessels to assist the vital resupply effort. The OCEAN GIANT and OCEAN GLADIATOR, both managed by Waterman, were tasked with delivering crucial cargo to McMurdo Sound.

The OCEAN GIANT arrived in January, hauling a massive 65-ton modular causeway system (MCS) that enabled vessels to offload cargo despite the absence of the aging ice-pier normally used for such operations. In February, it was the OCEAN GLADIATOR's turn to deliver vital supplies to the scientists. The ship was filled with containers of mechanical parts, construction materials, office supplies, electronic equipment and vehicles. Once the GLADIATOR made its

delivery, it was time to pack up and head home. Dismantled sections of the MCS were loaded onto the ship, along with 115 pieces of retrograde cargo. The vessel then sailed back to Port Hueneme, CA where their mission had begun in early January.

But the final task fell to the Coast Guard Cutter *Polar Star*. This vessel had created a 17-mile channel through the ice to allow the commercial vessels to reach the Station at the beginning of the mission. Then, it was time to depart the Pole after 67 days below the Antarctic Circle in support of Operation Deep Freeze 2023.

For the scientists left behind, it's another year of isolation. They'll carry out their important research cut off from the rest of humanity through some of the worst weather in the world. But as the austral summer months approach (roughly October to February) and the warmer weather starts to tame some of the sea ice, the U.S. Merchant Marine will once again be coming to call.

Liberty Contract

Members ratified an agreement with Liberty Maritime covering M.E.B.A. Deck and Engine officers for the next three years. The new contract was a long time coming after frustrating negotiations that kept Liberty officers without negotiated increases for eight years. M.E.B.A. President Adam Vokac headed up the negotiating team that secured this industry standard agreement. The new contract rewards the dedicated hard work of our Deck and Engine officers with strong wage, benefit, and work rule improvements that finally puts Liberty on par with other deep-sea carriers. The Agreement provides stability for both parties and should lead to further mutual opportunities in the maritime industry. Contract terms and benefits will be paid retroactively to October 1st, 2022.

Delaware Pilots Contract

Members of the M.E.B.A. contracted Launch Operators at the Pilot Association for the Bay and River Delaware can look forward to sailing for the next 5 years under a newly signed and ratified agreement. The launch operators are part of the Pilots' Association for the Bay and River Delaware. Our members maintain the launches and transport ship pilots

to commercial vessels transiting the Bay and River and its tributaries. The contract includes scheduled raises, cash bonuses, a uniform stipend, an additional paid holiday (day after Thanksgiving), and other improvements and benefits. Many thanks go to the hard work of Atlantic Coast V.P. Jason Callahan, Patrolman Nico Sermoneta, as well as rank-and-file members Donald Holladay and Joseph Brittingham.

NOAA Contract

M.E.B.A. engineers sailing for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration ratified a newly negotiated five-year agreement following a 10-day online vote. The M.E.B.A. negotiating team secured major enhancements for our mariners including pay increases, penalty time improvements and other quality of life upgrades. During talks, two issues important to NOAA engineers went to mediation and were settled by an impasse panel, both in favor of the M.E.B.A. The M.E.B.A. negotiating team was headed up by Gulf Coast V.P. Adam Smith and included Government Fleet Representative Jack Menendez, Tampa Branch Agent Nicole Greenway, HQ Contracts Officer Mark Gallagher and rank-and-file members Sean Battles, Eric Hague and Nicolas Lagen.

New CMES CONMAR Course is One-Stop Training Shop

In a boon for M.E.B.A. officers who plan to sail on the Patriot-managed Watson-class LMSRs, the Calhoon M.E.B.A. Engineering School (CMES) has implemented an all-encompassing two-week training course that satisfies Military Sealift Command requirements and standards to work on those vessels.

After MSC implemented new training requirements for engineers working aboard the contracted Watson-class LMSRs, the M.E.B.A. Trustees directed the CMES to establish a catch-all course for our officers to get that training in-house. CMES Director Bryan Jennings took charge and headed up an exhaustive and methodical process to design, implement and win Military Sealift Command approval for the new MSC CONMAR course that incorporates seven individual classes required by deck and engine officers for those jobs.

The classes included in the overall CONMAR course are also available as stand-alone CMES courses for those mariners who are already certified in some of the required modules and aren't pushing up against their renewal dates. The seven classes combined into the CONMAR course are Security Watchstander Basic (required once

Born on April 4, 1923, Jesse made his final voyage on October 22, 2013 at the age of 90.

The resolution that was introduced during the April 2011 membership meeting at M.E.B.A.'s Seattle Union hall was approved by the membership the next month. It read, (in part), "Be it Resolved, that April 4th of

every calendar year starting in the 2012 calendar year shall be deemed an M.E.B.A. paid holiday, and this day shall be celebrated, respected and remembered by all of the rank & file M.E.B.A. members as Jesse M. Calhoon's birthday, and further that all M.E.B.A. Union halls shall be closed for business on this date."
